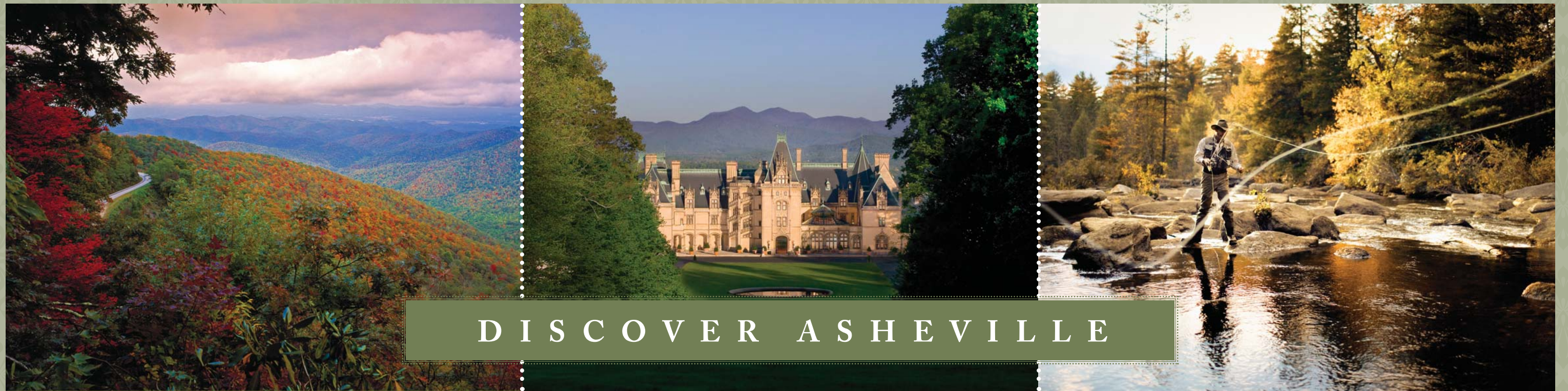

THE ARTS

The Asheville area has long been known as a haven to the arts, offering an atmosphere of creativity and expression. Home to the Folk Art Center, Biltmore Village, Orange Peel and Grove Arcade, Asheville boasts hundreds of fine and folk artists, musicians and mountain crafters. The city hosts arts and music festivals year-round, such as the Mountain Dance and Folk Festival, Asheville FringeArts Festival and Breakaway Jazz Festival. Its annual Bele Chere Festival is one of the Southeast’s largest free outdoor events, attracting thousands to a weekend full of live music and an array of arts and crafts.

GROVE PARK INN

The Grove Park Inn, a historic resort hotel that overlooks downtown Asheville, can be credited for bringing the area into the forefront of American health and rejuvenation. Opened in 1923, the Inn offers guests award-winning spa treatments, golf, restaurants and a Great Hall that will not soon be forgotten.

PISGAH NATIONAL FOREST

“The Land of the Waterfalls”

This is the personal playground of Asheville residents. Hike, mountain bike, kayak, climb, fly fish and bird watch in more than 500,000 untouched acres of forest. This unique land includes elevations near 6,000 feet; more than 200 waterfalls; and miles and miles of hiking trails, creeks and rivers. In fact, Pisgah National Forest is home to Whitewater Falls, the highest waterfall in the eastern United States.

BLUE RIDGE PARKWAY

America’s Favorite Drive

The Blue Ridge Parkway is America’s First Scenic Highway, attracting more than 40 million visitors annually (highest of all national parks in the U.S.). Not only does it connect The Cliffs at Walnut Cove to The Cliffs at High Carolina, it connects Shenandoah National Park in Virginia with the Great Smoky Mountains National Park in North Carolina, with 469 miles of meadows, mountain tops and seemingly endless views of nature in between.

BILTMORE ESTATE

America’s Largest Private Home

Tour George Vanderbilt’s 175,000-square-foot masterpiece, which includes original art from masters such as Renoir, magnificent 16th-century tapestries, a Banquet Hall with a 70-foot ceiling and priceless antiques. You can also enjoy an award-winning winery, fine dining and 8,000 acres of grounds.
